Dear Fellow Disciples,

Some months ago I read the book What's Love Got to Do with It? How the Heart of God Shapes Worship by the Rev. Dr. Sam Hamstra, Affiliate Professor of Worship and Church History at Northern Seminary in Lombard, IL. Professor Hamstra was hired by Dr. Charles Hambrick-Stowe, former Academic Dean of Northern Seminary, to this position in 2007. Dr. Hamstra has served congregations in the Reformed Church in America and the Christian Reformed Church in America, and has a deep interest in Mercersburg Theology.

In the preface, Dr. Hamstra states that the entire Christian life, including our corporate worship, must be understood as our loving response to the love of the Triune God. Later in the book. Dr. Hamstra writes: Our loving fellowship as local congregations is both a gift of grace and a command. When we draw from the well of God's love and love one another, we experience a love far deeper and richer than the fellowship we may have as family and friends. This divine love supersedes the fellowship we may have had as immigrants speaking a common language. It flows from the Holy Spirit of God by whose power we may respond to the love of God with both love for our Beloved and for others. And our love for others, like the love of God, will break down barriers and overcome prejudices; it will be beyond our comprehension (Ephesians 2:19-20), but not our aspirations. (pgs. 59-60)

At the heart of our faith is our love for God and our neighbor. Our worship prepares us for this way of life. We experience this love as sing praise to the God who loves us, redeems us, and strengthens us. Some of this is at the heart of why I have proposed some minor changes to the Service of Word & Sacrament. There is a separate article about those changes in this newsletter.

We recently offered this love to five new members who joined our congregation. Look for their pictures and biographies in this newsletter. We also offer this love every Sunday when we welcome others to our church. This is why I am very concerned about locking our doors during our second worship service. I am not naïve to the world in which we live. but I also believe that there is no way we can totally prevent a tragedy from happening. So I raise some important questions: Are we really offering hospitality to our brothers or sisters in Christ? Are we allowing fear to take over rather than believing that the presence of Christ is with us?

At the heart of the Christian life is love. Yes, our love for one another will break down barriers! Join us in worship this summer as we continue to hear the promise of God's love, and are empowered to welcome others with the gift of God's love!

#### Stewardship XXIV by Rev. Jack Esbenshade

"The essence of all great art is gratitude." [Friedrich Nietzsche]

When I came upon this quote I immediately thought of my duty to write this column. I don't think that this is the time or place to focus on 19th century German philosophers. But Nietzsche has something to say to us about how we express our thanks. And one of those ways is through art.

Now Nietzsche doesn't distinguish the expression of the art – be it visual or musical, mental or tactile. But he does raise the idea that any such an expression of the artist is one of gratitude.

I must admit that thought had not crossed my mind. But upon reflection it does make sense. Those works of great art evoke all sorts of emotion and if the art can draw those feelings from us, then the artist must have imbued the art with a similar amount of emotion.

On a recent Sunday I was headed to church and Krista Tippet was interviewing Elizabeth Gilbert on her radio program "On Being." The guest talked about how creativity is innate within us and that it is creativity which separates us from other forms of life on this planet. She said that all our ancestors were creative; tens of thousands of years of creative people are a part of our heritage. She went on to say that humans spend their time making things, altering things, composing things. It's all a part of us. Observe a child of 3 or 4 with crayons and paper or Legos. The child continues to create and express. In the child we can see how the creative seeds are planted in each of us.

So I thought we could be a bit philosophical and reflective over the summer and I put together these two thoughts - being creative and using that creative nature to express one's gratitude. And I pose these questions for your reflection. Is your creativity a reflection of the creator? If your life is your work of art, is it an expression of your gratitude?



### CHANGES TO THE SERVICE OF WORD & SACRAMENT by Pastor Rankin

A group of pastors (most of them are members of our congregation) and scholars meet on a monthly basis from September-May for a book study centered on Mercersburg Theology. This academic year we studied *Gift and Promise: An Evangelical Theology of the Lord's Supper* by the Rev. Dr. Peter Schmiechen, President Emeritus/Professor of Theology at Lancaster Theological Seminary. Dr. Schmiechen raised some interesting questions in the preface:

- --What if the goal of an evangelical approach to the Lord's Supper, initiated by the Reformers, was being fulfilled in theological and biblical studies in our times, as well as in actual changes in liturgies?
- -What would happen if we laid out a theology of the Lord's Supper in light of the Reformers' initial intent and the theological and biblical studies that have formed piety and understanding in this time?

One of Dr. Schmiechen's concerns is that our Eucharist services tend to be viewed as an additional liturgy to the Service of the Word. Therefore, he proposes a service where parts of the liturgy will be moved in order to have a more unified order of worship that will effectively proclaim the Word of promise made known to us in Jesus Christ. Some of our clergy members suggested that Trinity could try to implement some of these changes. I spoke with some of my colleagues and with the Board of Elders about these changes. They offered feedback and support. I wanted to write some background information for the congregation before we make these changes in July. So what can you expect in this unified service?

- 1. **The Invitation to the Table** will be part of our Gathering/Call to Worship. From the very beginning of the liturgy, our attention will be on the Word of promise we receive at the Lord's Table.
- 2. **The Peace of Christ** will be right before we receive communion. As we break the host and pour the cup, our liturgy reminds us that we come together with different needs and hopes, but we come together as one, but in order for us to experience that unity we must seek peace and reconciliation with one another.
- 3. **The Prayer of the Faithful** will be part of our communion liturgy. We gather at the table as the family of God, so it is appropriate that at this time in the service to pray for one another, our community, the world, and ourselves.

After a few months with these changes, I will discuss with the Elders and the other colleagues in the congregation. Please feel free to talk with me at any time about these changes to our liturgy.





He was on the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise and was a nuclear weapons instructor, participating in the Cuban Missile Blockade in 1962. Harry served as a patrol sergeant and detective in Chester County. He was also a state park ranger and an agent with the PA Public Utility Commission.

Raised in the Lutheran Church, Harry was ordained in the Wesleyan Methodist Church and then later transferred to the United Church of Christ. He received his Doctor of Ministry degree from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Dr. Covert served the following ministries: State Park Chaplain (1982); Supply Pastor, Stonington Wesleyans (1983-84); Pastor, Delaware Run Wesleyans (1984-88); Chaplain, Rockview State Prison (1988-95); and Pastor, St. Peter's U.C.C., State

College (1995-04). He was also an adjunct professor in the criminal justice program at Penn State. Following his retirement in 2004, Harry did supply work for 12 churches of various denominations. He recently led our adult Lenten study on his book *Ministry with the Incarcerated*. This is one of seven books written by Dr. Covert.

Harry's hobbies include Harley Davidson motorcycles, sports cars (both are probably in the past now), writing, and hiking. The most exciting thing Harry did was sky diving.

Kathy grew up in Reading, Pa. She attended Penn State Berks Campus and main campus at University Park, studying Elementary Education. She worked at the State Correctional Institution at Rockview as a records specialist and retired after 27 yrs. Yes, Harry & Kathy met in prison and have been married for 29 years. Kathy attended AME and Mennonite churches as a child. She enjoys travelling and reading. Harry & Kathy transferred to Trinity from St. Peter's U.C.C., State College


