

"GOD MEND THINE EVERY FLAW" By Rev. Dr. Charlie Hambrick-Stowe (Anne Rankin's father)

Our best national hymn, I believe, is "America the Beautiful" ("O Beautiful for Spacious Skies"). Written in 1893 by Wellesley College professor Katherine Lee Bates during a trip to the Chicago World's Fair and a summer teaching engagement in Colorado, it was published in a Boston newspaper in 1894. The words were sung to various tunes until World War I, when the hymn was forever joined to MATERNA, music originally composed for "O Mother Dear, Jerusalem."

The imagery of spacious skies, amber waves of grain, majestic mountains, and heroes proved through liberating strife always inspires. But what makes the hymn great is that it goes beyond patriotic emotion. It is a clear-minded prayer for God to take what is good about our country and make it better, to take what is wrong and make it right, to take what is hopeful and fulfill it, to take our national sins and "mend [our] every flaw."

In the 1890s the notion of "brotherhood" was a sham. Anti-Catholic sentiment was strong, new immigrants faced discrimination, native peoples were reduced to living on reservations, and blacks existed under the harsh reality of Jim Crow restrictions. Still, we pray for God to "shed his grace" on America "and crown thy good with brotherhood from sea to shining sea."

We have always prized individual liberty, but this easily becomes an excuse for selfishness. Singing, we pray for God to "confirm thy soul in self-control, thy liberty in law." This has always been a land of opportunity, but it so easily becomes just about the money. Thus: "May God thy gold refine, till all success be nobleness, and every gain divine." American cities in the 1890s were squalid, violent, and disease-ridden, but we pray the "patriot dream" that somehow "beyond the years" our cities will "gleam, undimmed by human tears." We still sing the hymn. We must still pray the prayer. **U.C.C. DESK CALENDARS**: It is that time of the year to order the U.C.C. desk calendars. <u>SPECIAL COMMORATIONS IN THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH</u> JULY 6—JAN HUS, MARTYR, DIED IN 1415

Jan Hus was a Bohemian priest who spoke against abuses in the church of his day in many of the same ways Luther would a century later. He spoke against the withholding of the cup at the eucharist and because of his stance was excommunicated, not for heresy but for insubordination toward his archbishop. He preached against the selling of indulgences and was particularly mortified by the indulgence trade of two rival claimants to the papacy who were raising money for war against each other. He was found guilty of heresy by the Council of Constance and burned at the stake. The followers of Hus became known as the Czech Brethren and eventually continued as the Moravian Church.

JULY 11---BENEDICT OF NURSIA, ABBOT OF MONTE CASSINO, DIED AROUND 540

Benedict is known as the father of Western monasticism. He was educated in Rome but was appalled by the decline of life around him. He went to live as a hermit, and a community of monks came to gather around him. In the prologue of his rule for monasteries, he wrote that his intent in drawing up his regulations was "to set down nothing harsh, nothing burdensome." It is that moderate spirit that characterizes his rule and the monastic communities that are formed by it. Benedict still encourages a generous spirit of hospitality in that visitors to Benedictine communities are to be welcomed as Christ himself.

JULY 12---NATHAN SÖDERBLOM, BISHOP OF UPPSALA, DIED IN 1931

In 1930, this Swedish theologian, ecumenist, and social activist received the Nobel Prize for peace. Söderblom (pronounced Zay-der-blom) saw the value of the ancient worship of the church catholic and encouraged the liturgical movement. He also valued the work of liberal Protestant scholars and believed social action was a first step toward a united Christianity. He organized the Universal Christian Council on Life and Work, one of the organizations that in 1948 came together to form the World Council of Churches. FIRST READING: Isaiah 66:10-14

Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad for her, all you who love her; rejoice with her in joy, all you who mourn over her-¹¹that you may nurse and be satisfied from her consoling breast; that you may drink deeply with delight from her glorious bosom. ¹²For thus says the LORD: I will extend prosperity to her like a river, and the wealth of the nations like an overflowing stream; and you shall nurse and be carried on her arm, and dandled on her knees. ¹³As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you; you shall be comforted in Jerusalem.

¹⁴You shall see, and your heart shall rejoice; your bodies shall flourish like the grass; and it shall be known that the hand of the LORD is with his servants, and his indignation is against his enemies.

Psalm 66:1-9

SECOND READING: Galatians 6:[1-6] 7-16

[My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. ²Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. ³For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. ⁴All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbor's work, will become a cause for pride. ⁵For all must carry their own loads.

⁶Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.]

⁷Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. ⁸If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. ⁹So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. ¹⁰So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith. ¹¹See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! ¹²It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. ¹³Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. ¹⁴May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. ¹⁵For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! ¹⁶As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

GOSPEL: Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ²He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. 3Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' ⁶And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ⁷Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ⁸Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ⁹cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' ¹⁰But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.'

¹⁶"Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me."

¹⁷The seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" ¹⁸He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. ¹⁹See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. ²⁰Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."
