I know it is not easy to talk about death, but the Lenten season is a good time to face our mortality. From a pastoral perspective, I have found those conversations to be helpful for me and for the family of someone who is facing the end of their earthly life.

As we begin our Lenten walk with Christ to the cross, I offer these words from Rev. Dr. Walter Brueggemann, U.C.C. minister and Professor Emeritus of Old Testament at Columbia Theological Seminary:

We must speak about death, not because we are excessively fascinated by it or because it is fun to talk about, but because in that Friday drama, Jesus knew who he was and gave himself in love for the sake of the world, gave himself to the poor, the needy, the desiring, but also for the wise, the strong, the controlling. And in his act of vulnerability, his power to love broke all the power of violence and brutality. (*A Gospel of Hope*, 2018)

I hope you will join us for our Lenten walk this year. We will gather for worship on Wednesday evenings to lift up men and women who are models of faith for us. We will gather on Sunday mornings for special adult classes. The first half will focus on the men and women who were the first followers of Christ. The second half will then focus on finding the gospel message in the Old Testament. Our worship and study will help us walk with Christ to the cross as he gives himself in love for all of us. May that act of love encourage us to seek ways to put an end to the violence that plagues our world this day!

In my February Parish Post column, I concluded with the first and last verses of the great hymn *Abide with Me*. I have decided to end this month's column with the fourth verse. May these words be our Lenten prayer:

I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless: Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness. Where is death's sting? Where grave, thy victory? I triumph still, if Thou abide with me. (Hymn #51 by Henry Francis Lyte, 1847)

CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS by Denise Pfeiffer

The financials of Trinity UCC are favorable. As reported on the January report from our Treasurer, we had a positive position (net income) of \$8,998. Some of this was the result of a large single contribution and several enrollment and tuition payments for the spring sessions of the preschool. As discussed before, inflation is having an impact on finances however, the property committee found a lower priced trash hauler and is working on lowering our electric cost by finding another provider. Scott provided Consistory with a yearend worksheet showing how Trinity gave \$65,117 to other charitable organizations. The Treasurer noted that our average monthly expenses were \$34,132 and we have 118 days of liquidity.

Pastor Chris reported that we have 2 persons want to join Trinity. Anniversary plans are going well and the committee has lots of exciting things for us to celebrate. More to follow.

Granted St Luke's, Lititz, a \$2,000 grant from the St. Luke's, Lancaster, Endowment for their "Lunch with Luke" program and granted a \$200 donation to the Earth Day Summit.

Pastor Rankin shared information about the Wednesday Lenten services and the Holy Week & Easter services.

Maundy Thursday services will be at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Good Friday Tenebrae Service will be at 7 p.m.

Easter services will be at 6:30 a.m. (in the parking lot), 8:00 a.m., and 10:30 a.m.

The Parish Life Committee will be organizing the Easter morning breakfast from 9-10 a.m.



For several years, members have been able to make weekly/recurring donations on-line in lieu of paying cash/checks or by mail. On-line donations save the cost of a check and envelope and if using the recurring feature, remembering weekly to prepare your envelope. Presently we have several individuals/families using on-line donations either weekly or recurring.

We believe that financial transparency builds trust and is a mark of stewardship so we want to take a moment to remind you that there is a small cost for this convenience. You'll have the opportunity to help cover the cost of processing when you give. Please know that this is 100% optional, but we appreciate your partnership in making your gift go as far as possible to impact our mission.

We have never asked our members to cover these costs especially since 2020 at the start of the pandemic. The costs are 1.05% when paying by check, 3.05% when paying by credit/debit card.

Beginning July 1, 2022, we added a feature to our on-line giving whereby you can help to cover the costs of paying online by debit/credit card or checking account. This is entirely OPTIONAL. There will be a check-off block to use if you wish to cover your transaction cost in addition to your contribution.

LENTEN DENIAL ENVELOPES: The Board of Deacons decided to divide the donations in the Lenten denial envelope to assist those impacted by the war in Ukraine and the earthquake in Syria and Turkey. Please be generous as we help our brothers and sisters in need.

TREASURE IN CLAY JARS by Rev. Jack Esbenshade

I have used this column to preach and philosophize, to reflect and reminisce. This month I simply want to use the column to examine the topic of endowments. Allow me to start by raising the question, 'Why do we have an Endowment Fund at Trinity Church?'

A position could be made that as people of faith, like the lilies of field, we should not concern ourselves with what happens tomorrow and that as people of faith, God will provide. And there is no question that for many of us, when we have been in dire straits, somehow the hand of God has been present to provide.

A position could also be made that as people of faith we have been entrusted with treasure. And even if the vessels are fallible and fragile, we are to manage and empower that treasure.

I am aware of some churches that live past their life expectancy because they survive on endowment funds. A friend once told me that when that happens, they're eating the seed corn.

But in the same way that we strive to save some of our earnings for retirement, endowments are a way that we, as a church, can save for the future. And endowments also enable us to broaden mission and ministry in the present.

Let me give you some examples – last year our endowments earned distributions of \$43,805. With those earnings we provided pre-school scholarships, grants to local churches, funds to repair the building, support for food and music ministry. In addition, the endowment fund enables us to provide a housing allowance for the pastor without creating an expense item in the annual budget.

If I thought for one minute that the Endowment Fund hampered the regular weekly giving of the members of Trinity Church, I would speak out against it. But such is not the case. Offerings in this church are strong. They come from our weekly/annual income. The Endowments are also strong. They come from our bequests and specially directed gifts.

In the life of Trinity Church, both aspects are important to maintaining a healthy financial picture. Riess Potterveld [former president of Lancaster Seminary] says this, "Our friends in the African-American community speak about, 'standing on the shoulders of others.' This is a recognition that forebears have made sacrifices and exercised leadership in ways that prepared the ground of opportunity upon which we now walk."

In light of our 175thAnniversary, this may be a time for some to consider making a contribution to the Endowment Fund so that those who follow in the next century can stand on our shoulders.

Crop Walk 1999

On a bright Sunday morning, several very young children, some barely able to walk, scatter through the congregation gathering bags of canned goods and other food items. Grabbing one bag with both hands, one boy is surprised at its weight, so a fifty-year member sitting nearby helps him carry it to the altar to be placed with the offerings of food being readied to go to a ministry for local school children called Hempfield Power Packs. One of a long line of ministries in the 175 years of the mission of Trinity United Church of Christ, the Power Packs project brings hope and nourishment to children of the community.

In efforts to serve the community in Christ's name, the congregation has also acted as a center for a food pantry, numerous members giving countless hours in gathering, sorting, and distributing food items to those in need in East Petersburg and nearby communities. Collaborating with other food ministries in the wider Lancaster area, a collective decision brought these ministries together into the Lancaster Food Hub. The concern for combatting hunger also reaches world-wide with the annual

One Great Hour of Sharing offering and the congregation's fifty-year participation in the CROP Walk to raise funds for the hungry in many countries. Our mission is widespread and ecumenical, seeking to be faithful in sharing the good news of God's love and reconciliation in a variety of ways.

Concern for children and youth extends to support for Bethany Home and Hoffman Homes for Youth, two denominational institutions providing shelter, counseling, and support for youth in difficult circumstances. Our 5-day-a-week pre-school program serves 65 children. With our offerings, we also support Milagro House in Lancaster, a shelter for homeless women and their children. Camping ministries for children and youth are conducted in cooperation with the Lutheran Churches of our area.

One notable service project in the congregation's history was the Night Ministry conducted in the 1960's and 70's. With a series of telephones set up in the church hall, trained volunteers from the church

took all-night shifts answering calls from people undergoing crises, guiding the callers to appropriate and helpful resources. It proved a very effective ministry.

Our ongoing ministries for adults include our support for retirement housing at Phoebe-Devitt Home and Ephrata Manor. We also support educational work at Lancaster Theological Seminary and through our mission support of teachers in other nations.

Sharing God's love continues to be the focus of our life as a church of Jesus Christ. Thanks be to God!



Life Line Screening goes beyond regular checkups to look inside your arteries for signs of plaque build-up

Carotid Artery Disease:

An ultrasound is performed to screen Index (ABI) test is the carotid arteries for buildup of fatty plaque.

Peripheral Arterial Disease:

An Ankle-Brachial performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs."

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm:

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm.

Atrial Fibrillation:



He has never played a sport but he is being inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame at the Lebanon High School. He feels very privileged to receive this honor. Why Are We More Susceptible to Respiratory Issues as We Age?

The lungs have two main functions. One is to get oxygen from the air into the body. The other is to remove carbon dioxide from the body. Your body needs oxygen to work properly. Carbon dioxide is a gas the body produces when it uses oxygen. During breathing, air enters and exits the lungs. When you breathe in (inhale), air flows through the airways into the lungs. The airways are made of stretchy tissue. Bands of muscle and other support tissue wrap around each airway to help keep them open.

Air keeps flowing into the lungs until it fills tiny air sacs. Blood circulates around these air sacs through tiny blood vessels called capillaries. Oxygen crosses into the bloodstream at the place where the blood vessels and air sacs meet. This is also where carbon dioxide crosses from the bloodstream into the lungs to be breathed out (exhaled).

Changes to the bones and muscles of the chest and spine occur as you age. Bones become thinner and change shape. This can change the shape of your ribcage. As a result, your ribcage cannot expand and contract as well during breathing. The muscle that supports your breathing, the diaphragm, becomes weakened. This weakness may prevent you from breathing enough air in or out. These changes in your bones and muscles may lower the oxygen level in your body. Also, less carbon dioxide may be removed from your body. Symptoms such as tiredness and shortness of breath can result.

As you age, changes also occur in lung tissues. Muscles and other tissues that are near your airways may lose their ability to keep the airways completely open. This causes the airways to close easily. Aging also causes the air sacs to lose their shape and become baggy. These changes in lung tissue can allow air to get trapped in your lungs. Too little oxygen may enter your blood vessels and less carbon dioxide may be removed. This makes it hard to breathe.

The nervous system is another part of the body that changes with age. The part of the brain that controls breathing may lose some of its function. When this happens, your lungs are not able to get enough oxygen. Not enough carbon dioxide may leave the lungs. Breathing may get more difficult. Nerves in your airways that trigger coughing become less sensitive. Large amounts of particles like smoke or germs may collect in the lungs and may be hard to cough up. Your immune system can get weaker, too. This means your body is less able to fight lung infections and other diseases. Your lungs are also less able to recover after exposure to smoke or other harmful particles.

As a result of these many changes, older people are at increased risk of lung infections, such as pneumonia and bronchitis, shortness of breath and low oxygen level. Abnormal breathing patterns might be more likely, resulting in sleep apnea, episodes of stopped breathing during sleep.

How does one prevent or decrease the effects of aging on the lungs? Do not smoke. Smoking harms the lungs and speeds up lung aging. Do add physical exercise to your daily routine to improve lung function. Get up and move. Lying in bed or sitting for long periods of time allows mucus to collect in the lungs. This puts you at risk for lung infections. This is especially true right after surgery or when you are ill.



Take care of your lungs and breathe easy!


